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Introduction


Kwong Wai Shiu Hospital (KWSH) is part of a team comprising of MOH, AIC and some Community Care Organisations involved in the full implementation of the interRAI system for the community care sector through capability development and change management interventions. Singapore aims to almost double the number of Eldercare Centres to 220 by 2025. The scale and scope of these Eldercare Centres will be expanded to help seniors monitor their vitals, do simple health screenings and link up with other service and healthcare providers through the use of interRAI Community Screener tool.

Challenges

Large variety of assessment tools are used in different service providers. Results are duplicative and inefficient to both service providers and clients as there are no assessment tools that are standardised across all services.
